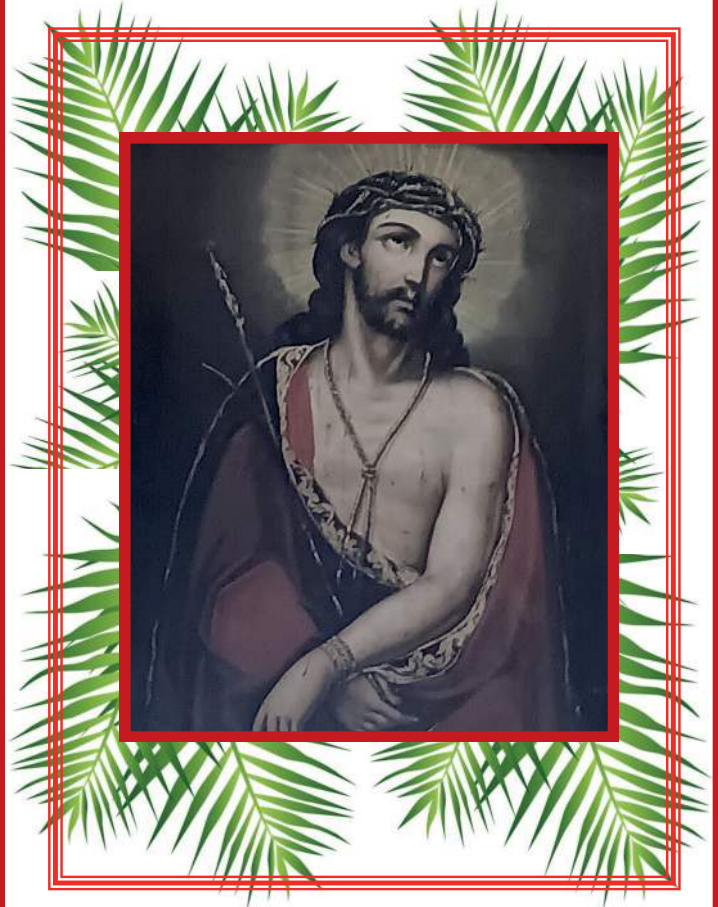

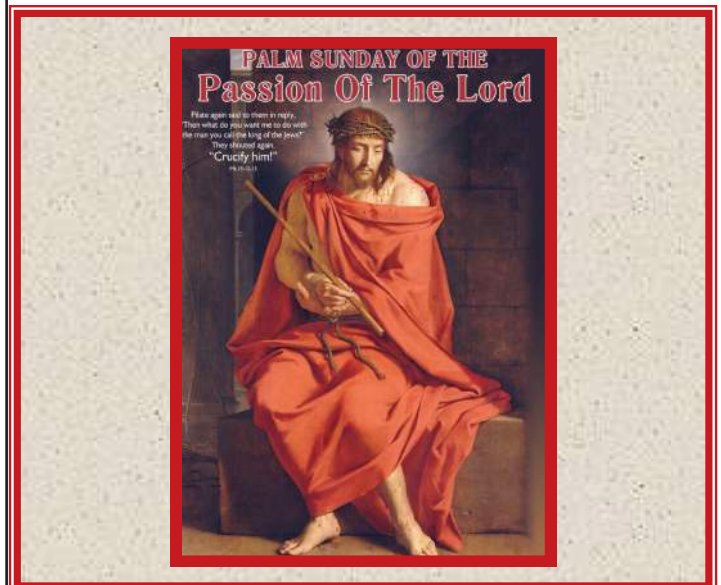

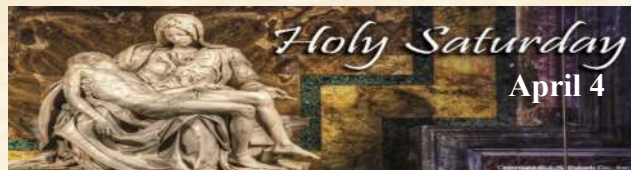

The Messiah

Holy Week is a dramatic week. Jesus entered into Jerusalem, and from that point forward every action is oriented toward His sacrifice on the Cross. Up to this point, He had been leading up to His final sacrifice, but this was not always visible to His disciples. Now, His purpose was clear to all around Him, and they reacted accordingly. This is something for us to ponder as we experience Holy Week, hearing the familiar readings of the road to the Passion. Perhaps Christ has become familiar to us, so much so that we forget the impact of Who He truly is, God made man, the Son of the Father, the Kings of Kings, the Savior, the Messiah.

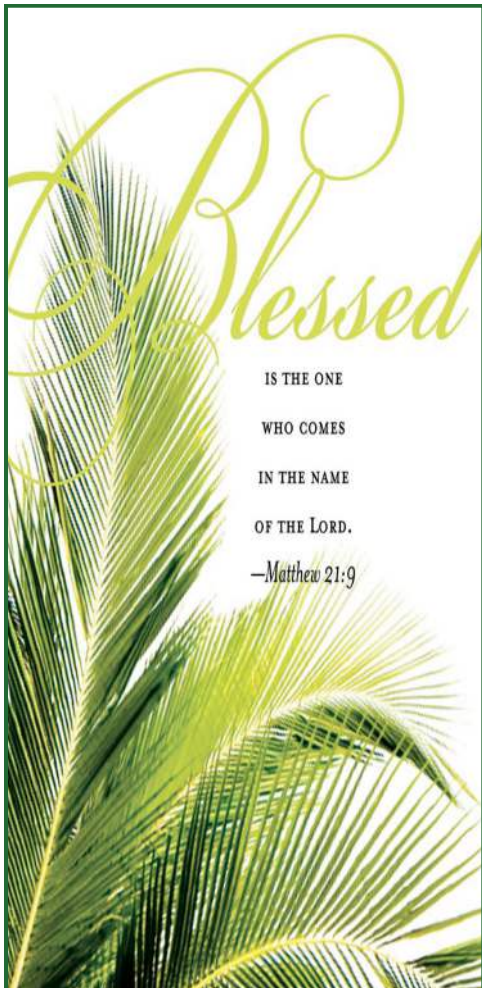
The people of Jerusalem recognized Christ's kingship and messianic authority as soon as He entered Jerusalem. He entered on a donkey, fulfilling the prophecy of Zechariah, and the people spread their cloaks upon the ground, accented with palm branches, a symbol of victory. They addressed Him as the Son of David, an explicitly messianic title, and told onlookers that He was a prophet. Already, the people recognized that Jesus was king, priest, and prophet, following in the lines of David, Melchizedek, and all of the prophets.

Peter, passionate and outspoken, told Jesus that He would never betray or abandon Him. He wanted to follow Him as his King and Lord wherever He went. Although he ended up denying Christ three times, he realized the gravity of his denial quickly, and wept bitterly for his disrespect and betrayal.

Not all treated Jesus with such reverence. Some treated Jesus with contempt, showing a deep hatred and cruelty in the proceedings of His trial and execution. The chief priests and the elders sent armed men to arrest Jesus, putting Him through a late-night examination, where He was subjected to heckling and physical assault. Later, they arranged for His scourging, after which the Roman soldiers placed on His head a sharp crown of thorns and beat Him with a reed. The criminals crucified with Him mocked Him along with the bystanders, telling Him to use His claimed divinity to save Himself.

We should realize that in their contempt, they were, in a sense, responding accordingly, even as others did Him homage. Jesus presented Himself as the King of kings, the Messiah, God in the flesh. Those who believed Him did Him homage befitting God Himself, and those who did not treated Him as a nefarious blasphemer, and if their assessment was right, that's exactly what He was. Judas saw both sides of this, first brutally betraying his Lord and then regretting his action to the point of suicide. Being a Zealot, Judas was part of a sect of Judaism that used extreme measures to bring about the coming of the Messiah. As the Zealots interpreted the Scriptures, the Messiah's coming included violent uprising. Perhaps Judas believed Jesus to be such an impostor that he thought it better for the cause if He were dead. Realizing after the fact that Jesus was telling the truth, He understood that He had arranged for the execution of God Himself.

Each of these people we encounter on the road to the Cross understood that Christ was making a staggering claim, messiahship, prophecy, kingship, divinity. They reacted intensely, with deep conviction, because they knew that history depended on whether this man was right or wrong. Let us enter into Holy Week with open eyes to see Him, and open hearts to give Him the homage He deserves as our King, Messiah, and God.

Palm Sunday **My Will Be Done**

One of the most comforting parts of the Passion story for me is the agony in the garden. That might sound odd, considering how the disciples fall asleep while Jesus is in distress. I suppose I could identify with them as they show weakness when Jesus needed strength. But I am really comforted by Jesus' words. If the Son of God had to tell himself and his Father, "not as I will, but as you will" (Matthew 26:39), I should be able to say the same. There are times when I would much rather have things always go my way, but that is not going to happen. So it's comforting to know that Jesus did not take the easy way out, but accepted the Father's will that he should suffer and die.

Whenever we say the Lord's Prayer we pray, "Thy will be done." But how often do we still take the easy way out? Ever hear someone tell a lie or spread gossip that hurts a person's reputation? We can choose to do nothing (the easy way) or gently reproach the other with a simple question, "What would Jesus do?" When I have a chance to help someone in need, do I tell myself it's none of my business, or do I ask if there is anything I can do? When I am hurt by the death of a loved one, or am injured in an accident, do I get angry at God for letting this happen, or do I say with Jesus, "Not my will, but yours be done"?

Luke's Gospel ends the temptation of Jesus in the desert with the phrase, "When the devil had finished every test, he left him until an opportune time" (Luke 4:13). That time came in the garden. and again Jesus had the last word, choosing to do his Father's will. Our temptations continue every day as we face frustrations, desire for things we can't have, unanswered prayers, or our own weaknesses. Even though we know God always does what is best for us when we would rather have what we think is best, at least remember to say, "Not my will, but yours be done."

A Week to Feel His Profound Love

Today's Gospel reading reveals the depths of divine love through Jesus' suffering and sacrifice. This passage is enormously long! As we stand to listen to the Gospel proclaimed during Mass, you may feel your knees buckle a little or your back begin to ache. Small children in the pews will fiddle and whine. Altar servers' arms will grow tired from holding their candles. You will also feel your heart break as we recall Jesus' pain and suffering, our contribution to His pain, and the profundity of His love for us.

The physical discomfort that you'll likely experience at Mass today is part of the genius of the Catholic liturgy. The twinges of pain or discomfort that we experience while listening to Matthew's account of the Passover meal, Jesus' agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, his trial, passion, death, and burial, is part of the point. We may offer our discomfort as a miniscule, participation in Jesus' crucible ordeal. By the mere act of standing for the Gospel, we may draw closer to Jesus' cross and understand his profligate and sacrificial love for us more fully.

Entering into Holy Week, we have just a few more days to rededicate ourselves to our Lenten penances, mortifications, and fasts, to get to confession, and to prepare our hearts for Easter. Throughout Lent, and especially as we listen to today's Gospel, our hearts are filled with compassion and gratitude for Jesus' suffering. Our Lenten offerings may not have been easy, as suffering rarely is, but our physical work truly prepares our hearts and souls to receive all that Jesus offers us.

Though today's Gospel passage is full of trials, Jesus, as a deliberate and loving participant in humanity's redemption, also reminds us of God's goodness. Jesus promises us that goodness prevails. During the Passover meal, Jesus gives the disciples His body and blood. And on the cross He offers that same body and blood in death for the salvation of all.

As the baptized Christians, we participate sacramentally in Jesus' death and resurrection. Entering into the waters of baptism, we die to sin, and emerging, we rise incorporated into Jesus' divine sonship. This is a sonship whereby we participate in the life of Jesus eternally. We know that without the cross there is no resurrection. Rather than avoid suffering this week, let us unite our sufferings to Jesus and prepare our hearts for Easter's victory over death and the opening of the promise of heaven.

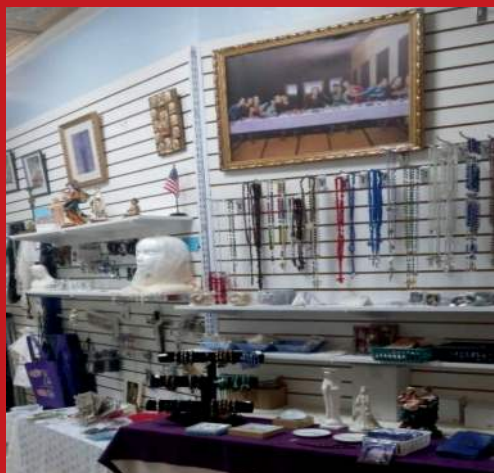
